


### Reasons 1

Last year, you were buying rice at Rs. 10 a kilogram. This year, you have to pay Rs. 15 for every kg of rice. Prices of everything are going up!

Economists call this INFLATION.


Have you wondered why prices go up? Here are three very simple explanations.





This year, four farmers have said, "We worked so hard last year that we never saw our children! We don't mind making less money this year, but we are going to work less.'

## So , all the farmers together produced only 80 kg of rice.





All the families in your village together need 100 kg of rice every year.

There is enough rice for everyone.



This year, your village needs more rice because of three wedding.



The shopkeeper thinks, 'Since there is more demand I can ask for more money for the rice! So ... Prices go up. Reason 3

There are thirty families in our village.







This year four new families have come to live in your village. They are very rich. This shopkeeper thinks since these families are prepared to pay more.
