
ne day when Jishnu, the Sarpanch of Vikaspur, was going to his fields, he found a stone.

"You don't?" asked the Voice.





Sun God chuckled and said, "Vishnu became Mohini to have a baby. Now, it's Jishnu's turn!"

An elder got up to say, "Every day, hundreds of women ...er....*people* die during childbirth. Let our Sarpanch be saved!"


Jishnu promised himself that he would not die.

noticed how many women


were pregnant!

People all over India heard about Jishnu. Newspapers said he was the best Sarpanch!




"Well," said the doctor softly, "it's a girl."
